## Polio vaccination clinics

The NHS has recently written to all parents and carers who have children aged 1-9 in London to inform them of the availability of a polio vaccine booster.

Children aged 6-9 can access the vaccine at local clinics. A walk-in clinic for children aged 6-9 only is open at [Hornsey Central Vaccination Clinic](#) seven days a week, 8am-8pm for the polio booster vaccine. Parents should bring their child's redbook. There is free parking onsite. Other local clinics are available for walk-ins and appointments.

For children aged 1-5 years, parents and carers will be contacted by the NHS to book a polio vaccination.

## Current Coronavirus Guidelines

Pupils and schools should continue to follow relevant [public health advice relating to COVID-19](#). The guidance states:

### **Children and young people (aged 18 years and under) who have symptoms of a respiratory infection, including COVID-19**

Respiratory infections are common in children and young people, particularly during the winter months. Symptoms can be caused by several respiratory infections including the common cold, COVID-19 and RSV.

For most children and young people, these illnesses will not be serious, and they will soon recover following rest and plenty of fluids.

Very few children and young people with respiratory infections become seriously unwell. This is also true for children and young people with long-term conditions.

Attending education is hugely important for children and young people's health and their future.

### **When children and young people with symptoms should stay at home and when they can return to education**

Children and young people with mild symptoms such as a runny nose, sore throat, or slight cough, who are otherwise well, can continue to attend their education setting.

Children and young people who are unwell and have a high temperature should stay at home and avoid contact with other people, where they can. They can go back to school, college or childcare, and resume normal activities when they no longer have a high temperature and they are well enough to attend.

All children and young people with respiratory symptoms should be encouraged to cover their mouth and nose with a disposable tissue when coughing and/or sneezing and to wash their hands after using or disposing of tissues.

### **Testing**

**It is not recommended that children and young people are tested for COVID-19 unless directed to by a health professional.**

If a child or young person has a positive COVID-19 test result they should try to stay at home and avoid contact with other people for 3 days after the day they took the test, if they can. After 3 days, if they feel well and do not have a high temperature, the risk of passing the infection on to others is much lower. This is because children and young people tend to be infectious to other people for less time than adults.



### **Little Wandle Rocket Fund Update**

Last term we launched our Rocket Fund raising money for additional resources for our new phonic scheme Little Wandle. We are ecstatic that we exceeded our target of £1,400 and raised an amazing £1,727.50. A huge thank you to our Gillespie community for your support and generosity!

## Year 2 Learning

There were Imaginative Insects everywhere in Y2 this week when they made origami monster bookmarks.



We read the book 'One is a Snail Ten is a Crab' by April Pulley Sayre and Jeff Sayre to see how different numbers can be represented using the number of legs that animals have. Then we created our own flapbook and chose four numbers to represent using the animals from the story. We then shared our flapbooks with each other.
