School Council visit Houses of Parliament

We were delighted on this important local council and Mayoral election week to have the opportunity to take our elected school council to a visit to the Houses of Parliament. The children discovered a statue of Emmeline Pankhurst the famous leader of the suffragettes who campaigned to get the vote for women. The children were treated to a special tour of the palace of Westminster during which they learnt about the history of this ancient house. They were given an introduction to its workings, including visiting the House of Commons and House of Lords. They were shown how our elected representatives debate and make laws that can affect all the people in the country. The children had a workshop about debating and democracy during which they had a special visit from our local MP Jeremy Corbyn who had a very active conversation with the children about parliament and democracy. We appreciated the time and insight he gave to our children. Our school council will be presenting their findings to whole school in an assembly soon.





Road safety reminder

Today in our whole school assembly I reminded children about road safety. We went carefully through the green cross code and reminded children why it is important to use this at all times whether you are 6 years old or 60 years old. 
Islington Football League

Year 1's science topic this term is plants. We cut some fruit and leaves up and use our observational skills to draw a detailed drawing of each of them.




Reception Learning


It has been a very busy week in reception!

Science Committee and the Royal Society's Young People's Book Prize 2023

Our Gillespie Science Committee spent many weeks reading, reviewing and judging the six shortlisted books for the Royal Society's Young People's Book Prize 2023. They chose *Deadly and Dangerous Animals* by Ben Rothery as their favourite book; however, the overall winning book chosen by judging panels across the UK, was *Am I Made of Stardust?* by Dr Maggie Aderin-Pocock.

The committee members did not only work hard judging books but also gave up a lot of their lunch times and meeting times to make a video which was entered in the Royal Society Young People's Book Prize Video Competition. Although they did not receive any prizes, they worked hard to make an original, creative and fun video about the shortlisted books. Future You Pilot Project with London Transport Museum (LTM)

I would like to congratulate the Year 3 and 4 pupils who joined me after school over ten weeks to take part in the Future You Pilot project with the London Transport Museum.

The pupils helped an alien, using 21st century skills (curiosity, communication, collaboration, creativity, critical thinking and problem solving), by thinking about sustainable solutions for a new planet. They did this by examining life in London in the past; life in London in the present and what they imagined London might look like in the future. Drama games were a big hit.

Each week they evaluated how their skills were developing. They learnt that experimentation and failure are key to innovation and skills development and also learnt about their own skills, strengths and uniqueness.

In week one, pupils created posters about what London transport might look like in the future. They were inspired by a poster from the LTM; AI images of future transport; past transport designs and biomimicry (using ideas from nature to solve problems).

A representative from the London Transport Museum visited Gillespie to teach the pupils about transport in the local area in the past. They examined photos and artefacts and then wrote postcards to the alien about transport in the past.

Pupils visited the London Transport Museum to participate in problem-solving workshops and to undertake a self-guided tour of the museum.

In weeks four and five, pupils carried out a wildlife and plant survey in the playground with help from a plant identification app. They compared their results against their hypothesis.

A STEM ambassador from Transport for London (TfL) came to our school and spoke to the pupils about how TfL is working to be more sustainable and fair for everyone. Pupils enjoyed sharing their own experiences of going on London transport.


Pupils thoroughly enjoyed working together during tinkering sessions to explore solutions to the climate issues they had identified. They worked hard to create prototypes of bridges; a power station and a bus and bus stop, and added working circuits or lights to their designs.

To top it all off, the pupils' work was displayed at the London Transport Museum alongside the work of pupils from five other schools. I am very proud of their efforts.
